RECISSION OF EMERGENCY DESIGNATION OF SHELLFISH LANDS IN THE STATE OF NEW YORK AS UNCERTIFIED FOR THE HARVEST OF SHELLFISH

Pursuant to the provisions of Title 6 of the New York Compilation of Codes, Rules and Regulations, Section 41.4 and 42.17, I, James J. Gilmore, Chief, Bureau of Marine Resources, of the Department of Environmental Conservation, hereby rescind the "Emergency Designation of Shellfish Lands" dated November 5, 2012, for particular shellfish lands in Suffolk County that are classified as certified pursuant to Title 6 NYCRR Section 41.3. **This order is effective immediately on Tuesday, November 13, 2012.**

Accordingly, the harvest of shellfish from the following shellfish lands is permitted:

Town of Southampton: All the normally certified shellfish lands in Noyac Bay and that portion of Shelter Island Sound lying southeasterly of a line from Paradise Point on Great Hog Neck (Town of Southold) to Crab Creek Point (Town of Shelter Island), adjacent to the Town of Southampton.

Town of East Hampton: All the normally certified shellfish lands in Northwest Harbor and Napeague Bay, adjacent to the Town of East Hampton.

Town of Shelter Island: All the normally certified shellfish lands in Coecles Harbor, West Neck Harbor, West Neck Creek, West Neck Bay, Menantic Creek and that portion of Shelter Island Sound lying southeasterly of a line from Paradise Point on Great Hog Neck (Town of Southold) to Crab Creek Point (Town of Shelter Island), adjacent to the Town of Shelter Island.

Towns of Smithtown and Brookhaven (north shore): All the normally certified shellfish lands in Stony Brook Harbor.

<u>Note:</u> All other enclosed creeks, ponds, coves and harbors within the Town of Southold, lying west of Great Hog Neck; and, the enclosed creeks, ponds, coves and harbors within the Town of Southampton, lying west of Jessup Neck, not identified above, or reopened by the recission order dated November 6 (effective on November 7) remain uncertified for the harvest of shellfish.
